

#### Victorian Miscellany

"Museums at Night" is a national event which takes place in May. Many museums and heritage sites open their doors to visitors after they would normally be closed. Special tours and activities are offered and these have become very popular.

Delicious fondant fancies and macaroons were offered, provided by Lynne Fitzpatrick who runs a business in Coningsby called "The Cake Fairy". These were very well received, particularly as they were accompanied by cups of tea poured through a tea strainer in true Victorian style.

The whole evening was a great success, an event we shall repeat in the future.

A presentation was made at the recent Annual General Meeting of the Woodhall Spa Cottage Museum to David Radford, Pam Cowlishaw and Marjorie Sargeant, who were retiring from the board. Presenting the gifts, Museum Chairman, Gill Noble thanked them for all their hard work and pointed out that they represented 54 years of service as Trustees or Directors – an amazing achievement and that they will be greatly missed.

David Radford co-founded the museum in 1986 and served as its chairman until 2010. His contribution to the success of the museum is immense; indeed there would not be a Cottage Museum in Woodhall Spa had he not had the vision to seize the opportunity of acquiring the bungalow and its priceless collection of photos and artefacts left by the

Wield family when it came onto the market back in 1985. He has worked tirelessly ever since to promote the museum at every opportunity with his almost legendary enthusiasm.

Pam Cowlishaw joined the museum as a volunteer in 2004 and in 2006 became the first chairman of the newly formed Friends of the Museum, a post she held until last year. She worked tirelessly for the Friends during this period both in organising the many fund-raising events, lectures and recruitment of new members. In 2008 she took over the position of Treasurer, a position she has ably held until she handed over to Judy Everitt in January of this year.

Marjorie Sargeant is well-known locally for the series of books she has written on the history of Woodhall Spa, the proceeds of which continue to help raise funds for the museum. She became a Director in 2000 and has assisted the museum in all sorts of areas with research work into various aspects of local history. She will continue to work with the museum as suitable opportunities arise.


#### Christine Sharp



#### The Temporary Exhibition Room - "Past and Present Display"

For the first temporary exhibition of the new season The Display Team wanted to create an exhibition that would engage with the local community, so what better than to use a selection of images taken from John Wield's archive showing domestic dwellings that were built in Woodhall around the turn of the twentieth century.

The exhibition consisted of illustrated boards mounted on the walls and a digital display with artefacts in the display cabinets plus a quiz sheet to identify objects. Alongside each original photograph, one of the same house was superimposed, thus showing how much, if at all, the buildings had changed.

The response from local residents has been very pleasing. Many have visited the museum to see if their property was one of those on display. If it was they have had an opportunity to request a copy of the original for a fee to the museum. Several people have come to do some research on how the front of their house looked when it was "new" so that they can replace fences or hedges that have long since been removed.

The Wield archive contains many more photographs taken at this time. If a particular dwelling was not displayed then residents were encouraged to come to the museum and ask a researcher to check the entire collection. This has also produced some positive results.

Visitors to Woodhall have also found this display interesting as there is such a range of different styles of architecture within the vicinity.

The written feedback from visitors, both young and old, has prompted excellent responses, including, "An interesting and beautiful display", and "I loved the pictures on the walls." The next display in the Temporary Exhibition Room will centre on Jubilee Park.

#### 1986 and All That......

Hi everyone! It's that time again and wow, time does fly!!

This episode contains some further extracts from my first AGM as Chairman, held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of March 1988 which covered 1987. I hope you don't think it's the same old story, but some of the points made by me then seem to hold true today with the challenges ahead to retain our precious village's individuality.

Many hours were spent by the Trustees and helpers in trying to achieve what was a quite complex operation... provided we could make our payments to the bank of approximately £2,600.00 per annum in repayment of the loan. This is calculated, by the way, as £6,226.00 per annum in 2014 real term values!! It is a tribute to our treasurer and volunteers that we were able to achieve that and own the site by 1993!

BUT we were now in existence and the heart of our project was ours.... A piece of the old Woodhall Spa, right on the Spa Trail, just off the elegant Broadway near the old Cottage Hospital (Rose Cottage), near the railway line which brought more visitors to the Spa, beyond which lay the quaint Tea House in the Woods, the grand Victoria Hotel plus its grounds with the Spa itself and what was to become another of today's gems: The Kinema in the Woods.

The Cottage Museum is a building, which symbolises to me that the spirit, shape and form of our village can be retained if there is the will to do so.

It is no use complaining that the unique atmosphere of our village is being lost, if nothing is done to protect those aspects of Woodhall Spa which make it what it is and so attractive to the many visitors who come here because "its like just stepping into the past." as they so often remark. Not that I do not want Woodhall to go forth to the future, to be hidebound by its past, but I would like to see that progress continue to be directed with loving care. It is essential that those unique frontages still remaining on The Broadway and Station Road be preserved, the garden quality of the woods and of the centre and outskirts be protected from too much infilling and overcrowding, something that could easily lose that gentle feeling of relaxation our Spa possesses...... original....this is the secret. Once we begin to lose originality and all that can be associated with it, then we begin to make do with copies which, however much effort is put into them, are NEVER the same. People will flock to see the original gold mask of Tutankhamun, the original Chinese Warriors, the original Woodhall Spa well mechanism working, as it sometimes does at The Museum of Lincolnshire Life, but will cast only a passing glance at a copy!"

So I wish every success to those who are taking the torch forward with Petwood Gardens and the Spa Baths and our woods but please beware unintentionally trading the long-established and fought over Spa's original 'garden atmosphere' in return for achieving those laudable goals.

I ended with "It has been an exciting and rewarding year- I trust that 1988 will show it can be improved upon! Thank you so much." In 2015 the reality of those dreams has been realised but the work goes on!


#### Dear Supporters of the Cottage Museum, Woodhall Spa

Hello everyone,


I love summer, don't you?

Snow in winter can be fun and winter evenings are cosy with the hiss of gaslight and a roaring fire to gather round but I love to be outside in the street with my friends in summer time, skipping, or playing with our hoops or marbles.

I have had two treats this summer already!

First, Papa and Mama, my brother, Thomas, and myself walked to a lovely big house, called Petwood. It was built for a very rich lady and visitors are allowed to see her gardens between 3 o'clock and seven on the first Wednesday of every month. Oh, the garden was huge! There were lawns and trees, shrubs shaped like peacocks, a pretty round pool, lots of flowers especially roses, and great avenues of big blooms of red and pink, called rhododendrons. What a difference from our little patch of vegetables with the hens strutting about and Percival our pig!
