





From the Collection - BERNARD SAMUEL GILBERT

Most readers will know or heard of the great and good of the 19th /early 20th century Woodhall Spa. For this newsletter, I turn to someone who is not that well-known but did a great deal for Lincolnshire and lived in the village.

Bernard Gilbert was an author and poet, born 1882, 6 miles away as the crow flies, in Billinghay. He was the youngest son of a seed merchant, Abraham Gilbert, founder of A.C. Gilbert & Sons. In the 1890s he was educated at a private school in Cambridge and attended that illustrious university in the first years of the new century.

After university, c.1905 he joined and then became the principal of the family business but did not relish the cut and thrust of the business world. In October 1910 he married Berwyn Cuthbert, the

daughter of a London architect. By 1911 the association with Woodhall Spa commenced. The couple resided at 'Calf Hey' which was one half of Tarleton House. They had a daughter Felicity b. August 1911 and a son Michael b. July 1912. Bernard relinquished his interest in the family business in 1913 and became a full-time writer under the patronage of Christopher Hatton Turnor of Stoke Rochford Hall. He collaborated with Turnor resulting in his first book, 'Where are we Going?', a book on the state of rural Britain. By 1915, the family had moved to No. 2 Sylvan Avenue. Two more daughters appeared in 1914 and 1915. He was engaged in War work at the Ministry of Munitions in London and therefore had to live in the capital, coming to Woodhall at weekends.

In 1918 he entered into a liaison with Kathleen Annie 'Georgia' Warne, a typist, resulting in a pregnancy and the birth of a daughter named Kathleen Gilbert. By 1921 the couple were living together in Kent. In 1927, Bernard contracted influenza developing into pneumonia and consequent heart failure. He died in the Temperance Hospital on May 5th 1927 at the age of 45. He was buried in St Michael's Church, Billinghay. Unfortunately, with development in the village, his grave site has been lost.

The writings of Bernard Samuel Gilbert form a rich body of primary source material. However, they lie little known and neglected. Gilbert's life and output have yet to attract a literary biography. Gilbert's writing includes poetry, famously, in a Lincolnshire dialect verse, historical novels, stage plays, political pamphlets and newspaper correspondence. His most popular book was 'John of the Fens', 1924, a story of the Stuart times.

Museum helps a University Professor

Professor Andrew Jackson from the Bishop Grossteste University in Lincoln has just published a seminal work on the Lincolnshire writer and poet, Bernard Samuel Gilbert. Gilbert lived with his family in Woodhall Spa, at two addresses, during the early years of World War I, before moving to London.

The Museum gave a considerable deal of help in researching not only Gilbert's time in Woodhall Spa but also his life story in general. Prof. Jackson kindly purchased some of the Museum's images to illustrate his book and has given acknowledgement of its contribution.

Nicola Marshall, originally from Billinghay as was Gilbert, found an original letter in Gilbert's hand, used as a bookmark in a second-hand book she purchased. This proved to be the kernel resulting in the current publication.

The Museum was represented, by the Head of Collections, at the inaugural lecture and book launch in July 2024 and Prof. Jackson gifted a copy of the book as a thank you.

Carlton's the Chemist

Towards the end of the nineteenth century, shopkeepers from elsewhere saw opportunities in this flourishing village of Woodhall Spa.

One was the century old Carlton's, the chemist's shop in Horncastle. They saw there was money to be made in this upstart village down the road and they found an ideal site on Iddesleigh Road, on the way to the Baths. They set up temporary premises while their shop was being built and in 1888 were advertising in the Horncastle News.

This was one of the shops seen by Mellow Observer when he visited Woodhall Spa just two years later, in 1890. How times change. Here we have a chemist advertising cigars! I wonder if he bought one, or an Air and Water cushion, perhaps?

Now a private residence, Carlton's is easily recognisable next to the Cottage Museum.



Dear Readers,

I am sorry to say that Woodhall Spa is not the happy place with everyone working together, which

we used to know. There has been such a to-do about the Baths.

I have often reported that since the Great War the Baths have not been doing well. Now, matters have reached a head. After the dreadful fire at the Victoria, when the old company was wound up, Sir Archibald Weigall gave to £2,000 ensure security of the Baths. There is a lot of work involved and it is costing the Weigalls over £500 a year of their own money to

keep the Baths going - I was going to write "afloat"!



Bertha November 1924 Now Sir Archibald feels others should be involved and the village has been asked to raise £750 for the Baths every year, to keep them open. Instead of being grateful for what the Weigalls have done, some people are alleging that Sir Archibald has not run the Baths properly. There have been groups of villagers everywhere, muttering and complaining and Perce says that in the Mall, there has been talk of nothing else.

So, on 25th October a public meeting was held in the Pavilion Cinema and just about every family was represented. Donations were promised but many people were arguing and shouting; it was most unseemly. Perce says there are always problems where money is involved and it was better to have it out in the open but it was exceedingly unpleasant - and some angry folk were our friends!

The matter is not resolved yet but surely, somehow we have to keep the Baths. We need them. Boarding houses like ours and hotels and businesses rely on them. Woodhall Spa would not exist if it were not for the Baths.
