The museum building itself is an important exhibit as a rare surviving example of a bungalow constructed of corrugated iron on a wooden frame. The displays provide a wealth of information about the rapid development of Woodhall Spa as a thriving spa town.

> John Wield (1877-1965) was a keen photographer and his photographic archive forms the basis of the museum. The Wield Collection, consisting of over 3.000 images, chronicles how life changed in Woodhall Spa and the wider community from Edwardian times until the mid-twentieth century.

There are plenty of opportunities for visitors of all ages to enjoy 'hands-on' activities. Open a drawer and investigate what is inside, settle down in the living room and play games as people in the past would have done, explore interactive information and enjoy a changing programme

of exhibitions.
