Annual Memorial Talk - Life of Major "Gentleman" Jim Almonds

This year's annual memorial talk on 11th November at the Golf Hotel will be delivered by Lorna Almonds-Windmill, daughter and biographer of Major 'Gentleman Jim' Almonds of Stixwould, a founder member of the SAS.

Lorna will be giving an insight into the incredible life of her father during WW2 behind enemy lines in North Africa and in the forests of France working with the Maquis, and his equally incredible escapades in the years after the war. There will be a book signing by the author after the talk and copies of her books, 'Gentleman Jim' and 'Escaping the Ordinary' having been on sale at the Cottage Museum over the last few weeks.

During October, there was a small exhibition in the Cottage Museum which looked at the early life of this boy from Stixwould, who became a decorated war hero and returned to live in Stixwould after his retirement until he died here in 2005. He is played by actor Corin Silva in the BBC drama 'SAS Rogue Heroes', the second series of which is due in early 2024.

This exhibition was produced by a group from Stixwould Village Hall, which was once the village school attended by Almonds

until the age of fourteen. We are grateful to the Almonds family for their help in lending us photographs and artefacts from their personal collection, many of which have never been shown before. The exhibition will also be open at the beginning of next season in April 2024.



It was made possible with a grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund as part of a wider project to preserve and renovate Stixwould Village Hall and its heritage so thanks to all of you who play the National Lottery and contribute to this work.

Admission by ticket only is £8.50 including refreshments. There will be a raffle and doors open at 2.pm with the Talk starting at 2.30pm. Tickets are available via the website or from the Museum Office, Tuesdays to Thursdays between 10am and

4pm.

Arnhem Commemoration

On Saturday September 9th members of the local Branch of the Royal British Legion gathered for their annual Service of Commemoration around the Arnhem Memorial in the museum garden, to remember the soldiers of the Parachute Regiments stationed in Woodhall Spa. who took part in Operation Market Garden in September 1944. Of the 2320 who left the camps around men Woodhall Spa only 435 returned, the rest being killed or missing.



Gloria Almonds then said a few words of welcome saying how proud her father would have been to see







From the Collection - A New Acquisition

Thanks to the generosity of two benefactors, in May of this year, the Museum was able to acquire a very rare object. Namely, a Wall clock (or strictly a timepiece as it does not strike but for the purposes of this article, I will call it a clock). What makes it exceptional is that it is signed by a maker from Woodhall Spa. I have never seen a clock with the village as a dedication. It is has a



mahogany case with what is known as a fusee movement, always a sign of quality. Its flat enamel dial has the name F.LOCK and beneath the winding hole, the all important WOODHALL SPA. The clock runs for 8 days requiring winding on the 8th. The clock can be dated fairly accurately to the last decade of the 19th century.

The question is, who is F. Lock?

Frank Lock was born in Margate, Kent in 1865. When he was 16 he was apprenticed to a watchmaker. 10 years later he had set up in the 'clocking business' on his own account, in Broadstairs, Kent.

By 1892 he appeared in Woodhall Spa with his wife, Clara and their son, William. What made them come to Woodhall is unknown apart from the fact

that the village was at its zenith as an inland spa. Frank may have seen a business opportunity. He traded from a shop in the Mall complex and probably lived in an apartment above it. He probably did not 'make' the clock but brought in the various parts and assembled it, adding his name and the village where he retailed it.

Frank did not stay in Woodhall for more than 8-9 years as by 1901 he was back in Kent as a bus driver! He may still have delved into clock and watchmaking but obviously needed another source of income. In 1920, he still described himself, on his sons marriage certificate, as a watchmaker. Frank died in 1926 at Gravesend in Kent.

Only one other watchmaker is known who set up business in Woodhall Spa at this time. That was William Jarvis whose 'base' was in Horncastle but rented one of the shops in the newly-built Jubilee Building on Witham Road, also taking advantage of the influx of visitors who hopefully would become customers.

Updates

I must also thank Mr Ian Mcdonald for his much appreciated contribution to the sad story of the Gibson family, printed in Newsletter No.44.







In 1890, when "Mellow Observer" visited Woodhall Spa, the grand Victoria Hotel, with its beautiful grounds was managed by a Mr. Roberts. An advertisement stated that the hotel was "under the personal supervision of the proprietor, Mr. W. J. Roberts (Late of the St. James` Restaurant, Piccadilly)".

Mr. Roberts was also responsible for the Mall, which still stands on Station Road today. Sometimes it was described as the Mall Tavern but as the advertisement shows, in 1890 it was the much more dignified, "Mall Wine Office."





Dear Readers.

This summer, a gentleman from our village travelled to London town and on his return he fascinated us all because he had seen the Baron von Eckhardstein! If you are a newcomer to the Spa you will not have heard of him but he was the first husband of Lady Grace Weigall. They often came here, staying at the Victoria Hotel, of course but they say it was because her marriage was foundering that she wanted a place of her own and had Petwood built.

The high society divorce case, with the Baroness and her lady friends smartly dressed in the latest fashions, was sixteen years ago. It was reported in all the important London newspapers and here we were agog at the scandal. Apparently, he, er... visited... other ladies and owed both Grace and her father huge sums of money.

One newspaper said that in his days of glory at the German Embassy in London, he was a "great giant Prussian guardsman in his white uniform and shining helmet surmounted by a silver eagle." After his marriage ended he returned to his native country and became Count Bernstorff but at the beginning of the hostilities in 1914, he spoke well of

the British and so was locked up by the Kaiser!

Our village observer said he scarcely recognised him now, because he was grey haired, bearded and stooped in his bearing. But they say he is still doggedly determined in his opinions.

We shan't see him here, of course. Lady Weigall seems very happy with Sir Archibald and they do so much good in the village that all of Woodhall Spa is happy with them!

This information quite took our minds off ordinary, mundane happenings, as the Season ended in Woodhall Spa.
