The annual series of free concerts in the gardens of the museum were again a great success, despite the weather being somewhat inclement at times. The series was due to start with the "CATS" - Coningsby and Tattershall Strummers, but this was cancelled due to rain and rescheduled for September 16th.

The first concert featuring Trad. Jazz with Colin and Gerry took place on August 5th. and was very well received. Equally popular was the afternoon given by Mike Warwick on August 12th. His format

Sadly the performance by "Sing Loud Woodhall Spa" had to be cancelled due to the weather and so the series of events concluded on September 16th with the rescheduled Ukulele band. The Strummers believe in involving the whole audience in their music making. Ukuleles and Tambourines were distributed around the audience and were used with great enthusiasm. Ken Mair - Unsung Hero


Volunteer Ken Mair has good cause to celebrate. He recently reached the age of 80 and within weeks was presented with the "Unsung Hero" Award at the John Barker Trophy Awards ceremony hosted by CommunityLincs at Heydour Parish Village Hall near Grantham on October 4th.

Ken has been a volunteer at the museum for about 7 years. He is a quiet man with an unassuming manner that belies the extensive contribution he has made which enhances the experiences of visitors using the community room. He joined the Management and Maintenance Team and carries out weekly checks on all the buildings, undertaking any necessary renovation. He has continuously put his extensive range of skills, especially in carpentry, to very good use.

The Heritage Lottery Fund development provided excellent opportunities for the expansion of activities and events that could be offered to attract more visitors, increasing income. He has fitted out the catering area within the community room to provide additional cupboard space and worktops. He has ensured all projects are finished to a high



From the Collection



The centenary of the ending of the Great War falls this November. Bearing that in mind, for this newsletter, I have chosen two postcards from the Museum archives, taken during the conflict, which both relate stories about the wider Wield family. Both contain 'snippets' of information which led to further research and poignant conclusions.

First we shall look at PC02476 (left); an interesting postcard in that itself is a collage of photographs and postcards. Who constructed it is unknown. In the top left is a postcard of a young man. Written on the card, published in Louth, is his name Clarence James. He may also be present in the bottom right family group at the back left. We also have a view of a young

mother and her child and below that a picture of a First World War soldier. In the middle is a view of a more recent date, of a young child in a high chair.

For our purposes the image that captures the imagination is that of the temporary

cemetery in the sixth view. The enlargement (right) reveals the detail. It is a First World War cemetery of a variety of graves. In the foreground is a most impressive grave with a substantial wooden cross on a concrete base. It is inscribed with the following



IN LOVING /RIP/ MEMORY OF 99262 L/CPL A.G.WIELD 231ST Fld Co RE KILLED IN/ 16.10.16/ ACTION

Is this Wield related to our family of Wields? Let us find out.

Thomas Wield, John Wield's father, had a brother, William, who also came from Hambeldon in Hampshire. John Wield in his family tree tells us that William had ...many sons. Indeed he did; he had 5 sons and 2 daughters. The fourth son was Frank John Wield (b.1877, coincidentally the same year of birth as of our John Wield). Frank and his wife Sarah Elizabeth had 2 daughters and a son. The family lived in Grimsby. The son was Alfred George Wield (b.1896). By the age of 15 Alfred was living in Doncaster, at 55, Cunningham Road, as his work took him there. He was a motor builder at the Electric Works in the town. At the outbreak of the Great War he enlisted appropriately in the Royal Engineers. He was sent to France and died in action on the 16th October 1916 in northern France near Mazingarbe near Calais. He was buried in the temporary Philosophe cemetery. This is no doubt the view taken in PC02476. This was later established as a War Graves Commission cemetery and Alfred is still interred there.

Here is a modern day view of the cemetery. Alfred's grave is in the second left row obscured by the gate pillar.

So, is the soldier pictured in our original card Alfred? The man looks older than 20 years of age. Are the woman and child related to him or to 'Clarence James', whoever he may be? Further 'hunting' is required.

Our second image PC02589 is a typical wedding day photograph. This day however was during the Great War when many couples pledged their love for each other despite what was happening in the world. It shows a young bride on her wedding day with her husband, a Lance Corporal in the British Army wearing the uniform of a horse based regiment – it is probably Cavalry or Horse Artillery. Also shown is the reverse with writing in pencil, by Gillian Jackson, John Wield's granddaughter. Here is the story behind this card.





John Wield had four siblings, one of which was his sister Harriet (b.1861). Harriet married Alfred Colbert. They had two daughters Kathleen (b.1892) and Ethel. Our wedding photograph shows Kathleen, John Wield's niece, on her wedding day in late 1915 at Peterborough. The handsome groom is Edwin (Teddy) Urwin. Unfortunately Military records have given no information on Edwin Urwin but we know he survived the conflict of WWI.

They had two children, Dennis John who died, aged 25 in 1943 and Kathleen Yvonne. I can find no record of Dennis being in the forces during WWII, so at present there is no explanation of why he died so young. Both Kathleen and Edwin however, achieved a great age and retired to Hastings in Sussex where they died, Edwin in December 1977 aged 87. Kathleen passed away in November 1986 aged 94.



Woodhall Spa in November 1918

Dear Readers.

Praise be! Hostilities have ceased! The dreadful war on the continent is over! The glad news was received with such enthusiasm in Woodhall Spa! It was a holiday with the bells of St. Peter's ringing out and flags flying at the Conservative Club and above several businesses and private homes in the village.

Children at St. Andrew's School were set at liberty for the rest of the day and everyone

ventured outside their homes, laughing and cheering; some forward gentlemen even twirled ladies around in the streets!

In the evening a united service of thanksgiving was held in St. Peter's. It was tightly crowded and many nurses and wounded soldiers from the Red Cross Hospital were in the congregation. Lt. Col. Weigall read a lesson most graciously and there was a short but earnest address from the

vicar. Oh, and the hymn singing – even my husband, Perce, joined in the lusty renderings of "O God our help in ages past" and "All people that on earth do dwell." At the end we sang "God save the King" and many worshippers were overcome by emotion.

Next day Mrs. Weigall gave bags of sweets to children at the school and the dear little ones sang patriotic songs, before Mr. Fairbairn, the Headmaster, led them in three hearty cheers.

Now the village joyfully anticipates the return of its patriotic young soldiers. Ah, that is the only sadness - the bereaved families whose brave young men will not return. Robert Wilson was killed in France just three weeks ago; he was only 19. His father has the shoe shop on Station Road and organised hampers for our boys at the front.




Volunteer Coffee Mornings

Dear Friends

The AGM in October was attended by the usual proportion of members and was an opportunity to review the year, including the turbulence in its governance.

Directors who had offered their support, ideas, enthusiasm and commitment were thanked along with those ordinary members and volunteers who had also contributed in a practical way at the events arranged by the committee.

Membership of the Friends has increased and currently stands at 100. This year has seen more Wield descendants joining and visiting the museum plus the group visits gave a great opportunity to extend the membership. The membership income for 2017 raised £531, events raised £941, activities raised £1359 and donations a further £510. Expenditure of £876 reduces the figure to a net surplus of £2465, a handsome sum and much appreciated. Thanks were extended to Trish Lowis-Smith for her leadership following the last AGM.

It was also noted that volunteers who worked in the café raised £3766 at the 1940s weekend, Music in the Garden events and other days. Less the expenses for provisions and the donation to the 1940s committee, the net surplus was £3251, another handsome sum.

The aim of the Friends group includes providing social events locally and visits to places or heritage sites of interest along with raising funds for the museum. Membership fees this year have already raised £188 with donations contributing a further £208. Events to date have all raised a positive amount that bodes well.

There was no recommendation to increase the subscription and renewal reminders will go out with the Newsletter. Renewals will be valid until 28 February 2020.

The new committee were elected with Martin Fearn assuming the role of Chairman on the recommendation of the Board of Directors of the Museum, Judy Everitt retaining the role of Membership Secretary, Margaret Reed staying on as Minute Secretary, Tracey Jones joined as a new member. Ann Houlton will be asked if she would like to stay on.

As retiring Acting Chairman I wish this committee well and am confident it is good hands.
