Woodhall Spa Cottage Museum Development Proposals

On the 10 December 2009, I received a surprise phone call that left me feeling both elated and very anxious at the same time. The reason, our Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) case officer had rung to say that our £400,000+ grant application had been awarded a Round 1 pass. HLF had also agreed to give the museum an immediate £64,600 grant to complete all the work needed to support the Round 2 application for the full £400,000+ grant. The elation was pleasure that all the work carried out by the development committee to prepare the Round 1 Application had been successful. The anxiety was at all the further work needed to prepare the Round 2 Application and its supporting documentation, ideally by December 2010!

So why do we need this phenomenal amount of money from HLF? The money will be used to conserve the main museum building, redesign the displays and significantly improve the storage and work areas. It will also allow the museum to be able to offer additional research facilities to those interested in the history and heritage of this once famous Spa and its inhabitants.

The main museum building, The Bungalow, is a very rare Boulton and Paul pre-fabricated, corrugated iron building that was erected on its present site in 1887. The aim of the planned conservation is to fully refurbish the building and to sympathetically introduce insulation and a greener form of heating to reduce the overall running costs. This will ensure that it will remain available for the benefit of future generations. The opportunity will also be taken to improve and update the museum's displays; the challenge here is to do this without detracting from the museum's present charm that is so liked by our visitors.

Visitors to the museum will be aware of the dilapidated outbuildings to the rear of the museum that used to be the workshops, photographic studio and donkey stable. At present, a small back room in The Bungalow is our meeting room; work room and storage area. The proposal is to fully refurbish the outbuildings to provide a good sized meeting/work room; an artefact storage area; a community archive that will house the museum's library and computer suite and a new display area for the museum's donkey drawn bath-chair.

Where do we go from here? Whilst we are back in competition with other projects at Round 2, the HLF website does say that 5 out of 6 Round 1 passes result in the award of a Round 2 grant. Furthermore, HLF would not award the museum the Round 1 Grant unless they believed in the museum and its future viability. In addition to all the paperwork required for the Round 2 application, there is the financial commitment. The museum needs to find £25,000 worth of donations and sponsorship for the project and additional matched funding – no mean feat in the present financial climate! There is still a great deal of work to do and we are keen to find volunteers to assist with the project planning and fund raising tasks. Meet the Directors: Jackie Goodall

During her career she held the position of Special

Now retired, antiques remain 'in the blood' and searching markets and antique fairs for 'little gems' can be classed as one of her hobbies! Once her educational background became known she was asked to develop activities with local schools. Always up for a challenge and enjoying new projects Jackie managed the successful 'Creating Memories' and the 'Treasure Box' projects both of these being given Heritage awards. Her interest has also led to her becoming a community governor at St. Andrew's Primary School.

Jackie has recently been elected Chairman of the Cottage Museum and recognises that, although David Radford, the previous Chairman will be a hard act to follow, with the support of the many volunteers the museum will continue to thrive and play an important role within the community. She is a member of the East Midland's specialist learning panel which is responsible for the development of good practice throughout the region. Until recently she was chair of the Lincolnshire Heritage Forum, a network of over fifty museums and heritage sites.

The Story of a Storm Boat Motor: By Jackie Goodall

Once upon a time a small museum in Lincolnshire decides to tell a story. It is about 3,000 soldiers who, in 1944 were based in Woodhall Spa, trained there and went to Arnhem. They were taken by Horsa glider to Holland but only 471 returned. The rest were either killed or taken prisoner. The museum team has produced a display about this and is raising money for a memorial stone to be placed in the museum's grounds.

The local community and various veteran groups are very supportive, and continue to give generously. This has enabled the stone to be purchased, and the Kinema in the Woods booked, so that there could be an afternoon when residents, veterans representatives regimental associations and local organisations can, free of charge, sit down to an amazing experience. The afternoon will include the famous Compton organ being played, a short film and sing-along, and the screening of the famous vintage film 'Theirs is the Glory'. Local schools have become interested in the project and are working together to produce an exhibition based on the theme 'War and Peace'. The exhibition is going to be in St. Peter's Hall and all this is planned to take place on September 18th 2010.

Far away in Holland a gentleman called Robert Sigmund had, for years, studied the history of the battle. He was a volunteer librarian at the Hartenstein Museum Oosterbeek and has written regimental books about Operation Market Garden. He organises the annual Arnhem weekend and publishes the commemorative book. He allowed the small Lincolnshire museum to have a full page in the 65th anniversary publication so that it could appeal for veterans who were based in Woodhall Spa to come forward and tell their story and some have!

A few months later, the chairman of the museum received a phone call from Canada. A gentleman named Bill McVean had been to the Arnhem weekend and spoken with Robert Sigmund. He wanted the little museum to tell how the 23rd Company of Royal Canadian Engineers were called upon to cross the lower Rhine and rescue as many of the besieged airborne troops as possible. This was achieved by the use of storm boats. Mr. McVean now owns one of the storm boat motors and has loaned it to the museum in order that this story could be told as well.

The storm boat motor is to be delivered to the museum shortly, where it will be seen by lots of visitors. As a result of ongoing conversations arranging for this to happen, the chairman received the following email from Bill.

Dear Jackie:

I have just been informed of the passing of Russell Kennedy, the man who operated the last storm boat to bring airborne troops out of Oosterbeek at the conclusion of the Battle of Arnhem. We had become great friends. I visited him two days before his death, he was as happy as I am about the motor, and its new home. We also talked about a new theory for the failure of Market Garden. Although Russ was 93 years old, he drove a car and was fully independent. I am so pleased I was able to tell him of the finalized plans for the motor, it means a great deal to me to have been able to tell him, as it would be the last time I saw him. Thank you for what you did to make this possible.

A 16 year Old's perspective of Woodhall Spa

Woodhall Spa is not known for its vibrant youth culture. However, we don't need a bustling city with a stream of Starbucks or a shopping complex to keep us entertained. On our own doorstep we have a variety of options to keep us occupied. Bainland and Jubilee Park provide the fitness factor with tennis courts, golf and swimming pool, film entertainment from the Kinema and the Coronation Hall holds a regular youth club for 11-19 year olds, offering activities such as dj'ing, pop and rock music production, arts and crafts as well as day trips out to go go-karting and to visit talent shows which many may not have the opportunity to do otherwise. Courses in Hair and Beauty and First Aid, both beneficial qualifications for career paths, are also available.

The graffiti that blights the side wall may reflect the angst of our local generation or simply a knee-jerk copy-cat response to outside influences. Fortunately Woodhall hasn't been as big a victim of vandalism as other villages. However there is a noticeable deterioration of standards. The BBC News once stated that Britain's teenagers are among the most badly behaved in Europe. I don't think Woodhall Spa's teenagers reflect this as the pre-dominant older generation help to keep a healthy balance and enable us to get on in life. The council and local businesses put a lot of effort into maintaining a well kept village. Our image reflects our attitude and so contributes to the lack of anti-social behavior and the friendly atmosphere in Woodhall Spa. In the current problematic times, many may indulge in crime because they lack a sense of belonging to a community, which we could relate perhaps to the bank break-in attempts and drugs discoveries in the last year. Places such as The Coronation Hall are putting their efforts into popularizing social values, inevitably having a knock on effect to the wider community and society.

Our generation is surrounded by media influences and constantly plugged into technology, as if it's some sort of life saving device which we have become dependent on, and addicted to. Relentlessly having to be entertained and switched on to everything that's happening. Feeling rejected if we don't fit the mould that the media falsely promotes, forced to carve out our own identity resulting in lack of true values, shallowness and a materialistic lifestyle, confiding through technology instead of direct human interaction.

Family values are a core asset with parents showing respect and not remaining fuddy-duddy but being empathetic, non-condemning and willing to listen. In return and most probably in time, the child will reciprocate.

Nearby villages such as Horncastle and Coningsby host regular events; musical social and sporting entertainment. The Coronation hall has frequent hobbies such as Salsa, Yoga and Spinning classes. The Youth club, held every Monday 6.30pm-9pm and Thursday from 7pm-9pm, welcomes old and new members. Richard Everard Webster, the 1st Viscount Alverstone

In my first article on the first Viscount Alverstone, I promised to share more with you in the next issue, so mightily impressed was I by this founding father who gave his name to one of our leafy avenues!

In a press obituary which announced his death in 1915, Dick, as he was popularly known, received the accolade "One of England's best-loved public men." This was closely followed by, "An athlete in his youth"... and that before his other great public achievements!!

So how did this come about?

Dick started his gentleman's education at King's College School and Charterhouse going on from there to Trinity College, Cambridge.


His sporting prowess soon came to the fore and he represented his college at the first Inter-Varsity steeplechase in 1864. Dick came second in that race. The next year, however, he won the mile and two mile races! He had frequently done the mile in 4 minutes 30 seconds it is reported! The Cambridge Alverstone Club was named after him and, it seems, a variation on The Lord's Prayer was dedicated to him ending in, 'For thine is the club, the tie and the track, For ever and ever, Amen!!'

Cycling was one of the pursuits of the age and Dick was one of the earliest enthusiasts. Then in his middle aged years tennis beckoned but at 60 golf won!

He maintained his interest in cricket and foot-racing and refereed races for the early Amateur Athletic Club and set the rules for long jump and shot put. No mean cricketer, he was President of Surrey County Cricket Club from 1895 until his death in 1915 and of the Marylebone Cricket Club in 1903!

I wonder what he would think of World Cup soccer's invasion of the time the good Lord had set aside for sunny cricket!!
